About the Author

Lou Drofenik B.Ed, M.Ed., Ph. D (La Trobe)



Lou (née Zammit) was born in Malta and lives in country Victoria. Lou has been involved in feminist research and is an ethnologist with special interest and expertise in the area of Maltese female migration. Her novel *Birds of Passage*, is the first novel to be written about Maltese women's migration to Australia. This novel is now used as a text in one of the courses at Malta University.

Her second novel, *In Search of Carmen Caruana*, which also deals with women's migration, won *Il-Premju Nazzjonali tal-Ktieb* in Malta for best fiction written by a Maltese writer in English.

Her historical novel *Of Cloves and Bitter Almonds* was awarded the North Central Literary Award in 2007.

Cast the long Shadow, is the winner of the 2010 North Central Literary Award and also won the 2011 Premju Nazzjonali tal-Ktieb for best fiction written by a Maltese writer in English.

Lou has just finished her fifth novel *Beloved Convict,* which is based on the life of a Maltese national sent to the penal colony of New South Wales in 1817.

Her bi-lingual writing and poetry have appeared in various publications and her short stories have been heard on national radio.

Lou is married, has four children and six grandchildren.

Retrospective

'The Maltese Diaspora – From Australia to America and in between'

Migration is controlled by two primary factors; a push from the home country and a pull from the host country. Malta is unique in having a very small landmass and a fluctuatina economy. "push" This sometimes matched with a "pull" from the host country where they promote and welcome an increasing skilled and Englishspeaking workforce. There are Maltese in every corner of the World, but most have settled in North Europe, North Africa, Australia and America. The presentation gave a historic review of migration from Malta. From the 1800 most Maltese migrating to America worked in the farmlands around New Orleans, in Louisiana. Following the first and second world war, Maltese migrants were attracted to Detroit, New York and San Francisco. The highest concentration was attracted to Detroit where the skilled workforce from the Malta Royal Dockyards found skilled work in the booming industrial heartland of America. The discussion touched upon some of the differences between Maltese in America compared with Maltese migrant to Australia. Wherever Maltese decide to reside, their identification with their culture provides support and assurance, as one of the most resilient cultures in history. A list of agencies that work with Maltese migrants in the United States was provided. A lively discussion followed where individual members of the Maltese Historical Society of Australia recalled personal experiences migrating to Australia.







"Il-Karnival ta' Malta"

Carnival (Maltese: il-Karnival ta' Malta) has had an important place on the Maltese cultural calendar for just under five centuries, having been introduced to the Islands by Grand Master Piero del Ponte in 1535. It is held during the week leading up to Ash Wednesday, and typically includes masked balls, fancy dress and grotesque competitions, lavish late-night parties, a colourful, ticker-tape parade of allegorical floats presided over by King Carnival (Maltese: ir-Re tal-Karnival), bands and costumed marching revellers. Carnival has been celebrated in Malta since the 15th century, but it received a major boost in 1535, five years after the arrival of the Order of St John. This started taking place officially in Birgu where a number of knights played games and displayed their skills in various pageants and tournaments.

The Parata Dance

True to an age-old tradition, Carnival was ushered in by the Parata which was taken very seriously both by the knights and the people in general as it was of special significance in the history of this festival.



It was customary for some peasants and later companies of young dancers to gather early under

the balcony of the Grandmaster's Palace and wait eagerly until they received formal permission from him to told the Carnival. The most recently appointed Knight Grand Cross would obtain the necessary permission and a proclamation giving the go-ahead to Carnival was immediately read from the Palace balcony.

This was the sign for the general merriment to start, and the companies dressed as Christians and Turks performed a mock fight recalling the Great Siege of 1565. Then a girl representing Malta was carried shoulder high and taken around the streets of Valletta. Meanwhile a stone would be hung from the Castellania, or Palace of Justice (now the Ministry of Health, in Merchants Street), as a sign that justice was "suspended" for the three days of Carnival.

Today

The largest of the Carnival celebrations mainly take place in and around the capital city Valletta and Floriana, however there are several "spontaneous" carnivals in more remote villages of Malta and Gozo. The Nadur Carnival is notable for its darker and more risqué themes including cross-dressing, ghost costumes, political figures and revellers dressed up as scantily clad clergyfolk. Traditional dances include the parata, which is a lighthearted re-enactment of the 1565 victory of the Knights over the Turks, and an 18th century court dance known as il-Maltija. The parata, in these days is being held by the 1st Hamrun Scout Group.

Food eaten at the carnival includes perlini (multicoloured, sugar-coated almonds) and the prinjolata, which is a towering assembly of sponge cake, biscuits, almonds and citrus fruits, topped with cream and pine nuts.




TIEQA FUQ IT-TRIQ
