ike the communities in the other Australian States, the Maltese community in Victoria gave a very warm welcome to the President of Malta, Her Excellency Marie-Louise Coleiro Preca, during her 4-day visit to Melbourne last July.

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Her visit to Victoria was the final leg of her two-week visit to Australia, which started in Western Australia on 11 July 2016 and included visits to South Australia and New South Wales.

On 13 July, during her visit to South Australia, the President participated as a guest Keynote Speaker at the inaugural Student Wellbeing and Prevention of Violence Conference 2016 held at Flinders University in Adelaide.

Mrs Coleiro Preca also took part in a panel discussion regarding wellbeing policies organised by the South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute (SAHMRI). She was also appointed by SAHMRI as a member on their International Consultative Council.

In Melbourne the President had a very busy schedule with a number of meetings with members of the Maltese community. These included meetings with the younger generations of Maltese, the Maltese business and professional community, and with other Maltese



associations including the Maltese Language Teachers Association of Victoria.

On 21 July the MCCV held a very well-attended welcome reception for the President at the Maltese Community Centre in Parkville (see report on page 4)

In Melbourne, President Coleiro Preca also visited the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre, Rosary Home for the Aged run by the Dominican Sisters of Malta and Melbourne's Shrine of Remembrance and the Maltese Shelter of Peace monument in the same grounds.

President Coleiro Preca paid a courtesy visit to the Governor of Victoria Her Excellency Linda Dessau at Government House. She also met with the Lord Mayor of Melbourne, Councillor Robert Doyle.

In her last engagement, President Coleiro Preca attended as Guest of Honour at the Charity Dinner Dance held to raise funds for the Malta Community Chest Fund over which she presides. The event raised \$11,000 (7,000 Eruos). ◆



President's Perspective

Welcoming the President of Malta

ne of the key highlights of this year for the Maltese community residing in Australia was of the Republic of Malta, Her Excellency Marie-Louise Coleiro Preca, made to this great continent.

After her visits to Perth, Adelaide and Sydney, where she met with the Maltese living in those cities, the Maltese community in Melbourne had the pleasure and privilege of extending our warm hospitality to her and her husband Mr Edgar Preca, the Minister of the Environment of Sustainability and Development, Environment and Climate Change the Hon. Dr José Herrera and the delegation accompanying her.

On 21st July 2016 the Maltese Community Council of Victoria hosted a cocktail party to welcome the President of Malta.

In my address I briefly outlined the history of the MCCV together with details of services that the Council provides to members of the Maltese community.

I also referred to the collaborative partnership between the community and the Missionary Society of St Paul (MSSP) which has lasted for many years and resulted in the construction of the Maltese Community Centre. I spoke about Maltese people on their visit to Malta and invited community the close relationship between Council, members of the MSSP and Maltese diocesan priests of the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

I also spoke about the sterling work of the Dominican Sisters of Malta in caring for the aged residents of Rosary Home for the Aged located in Keilor Downs. President Coleiro Preca had the opportunity of visiting the home during state. He said that he is particularly grateful to Malta for its her visit and meeting the residents, most of whom are Maltese.

As for the contribution of the Maltese community to Australia, I pointed out that the Maltese had not only given leadership to members of the Maltese community but also given leadership to the Victorian Ethnic Communities by providing four chairpersons to the Ethnic Communities Council of Victoria (ECCV). The ECCV is the umbrella organisation formed by the councils of all ethnic communities in Victoria, many of which are much larger than

I sought the President's assistance in passing on a message to our brothers and sisters, parents and relatives living in Malta: that, despite the distance and many years which have separated us, we still hold dear our love for our country of birth, language and culture. We have the same love for Australia as our country of adoption, which has provided us with a home to raise our children and great opportunities for advancement.

In closing I requested the President to assist in supporting our request for the reconstruction of the historical building of Australia Hall in Pembroke, Malta in memory of the many

Australian air force pilots and service people, who lost their lives protecting Malta against heavy bombing raids which undoubtedly the two-week visit that the President threatened to destroy Malta and its people. Australia Hall would provide a tangible monument to the close and strong relationship between the Maltese and Australian peoples and to the mutual respect and care that they have shown over many decades.

> In her reply President Coleiro Preca remarked on the warm welcome that she had also received from the Maltese in Western Australia, South Australia and New South Wales.

She particularly congratulated the Maltese on the manner in which they have integrated into the Australian society. She was pleased with their achievements with many of them holding high office and responsible and managerial positions in all aspects in society.

As regards the survival of the Maltese language in Australia, she said that it was not essential for our children to speak Maltese because Australia is their first home. She said that they will always be recognised as Maltese and no doubt appreciate the Maltese Culture which had been passed on to them by their parents and community.

President Coleiro Preca said that she met a number of members to contact her whenever they visit Malta.

The Hon. José Herrera spoke about Malta's economic progress and success he also referred to the opportunities in Europe open for those holding dual citizenship.

The Victorian Minister for Multicultural Affairs Hon. Robin Scott spoke highly of the Maltese Community in this assistance during WWII and, as a personal connection to his uncle, who served in the war in the Middle East.

His Excellency Mr. Charles Muscat, High Commissioner for Malta to Australia and Mr Victor Grech, Consul-General for Malta in the State of Victoria, were also in attendance together with Mr Eddie Micallef, Chairman of the Ethnic Communities Council of Victoria.

We trust that President Coleiro Preca will entertain a second visit to Australia in the not too distant future.

President visits Shrine of Remembrance and Malta's Shelter of Peace

he President of Malta also visited the Shelter of Peace memorial in Melbourne dedicated to Malta's war effort during World War II.

Between 1 January 1942 and 24 July 1942 there was only one 24-hour period when no bombs fell on Malta. The population spent so much time in their underground shelters that health standards declined, malnutrition spread and scabies was rife.

This monument commemorates the awarding of the George Cross by King George VI to Malta in April 1942 for gallantry of its people.

President Coleiro Preca also participated in a remembrance ceremony at the memorial.

President Coleiro Preca also visited Melbourne's Shrine of Remembrance located a stone's throw from the Shelter of Peace. The Shrine is Victoria's largest and most visited war memorial of national significance. It is Melbourne's most recognised landmark.

The Shrine was constructed between July 1928 and November 1934 in remembrance of the 114,000 men and women of Victoria who served and those who died in the Great War of 1914-1918 — 89,100 of them served overseas and 19,000 did not return.

Designed by architects Phillip Hudson and James Wardrop who were both World War I veterans, the Shrine is in a classical style, being based on the Tomb of Mausolus at Halicarnassus and the Parthenon in Athens.

n 23 July President Coleiro Preca was guest of honour at the Charity Dinner which raised more than \$11,000 (7,000 Euros) for the Malta Community Chest Fund. 

Fr Paul Kierce mssp

r Paul Francis Kierce mssp, who was born on April 9, 1938 in Melbourne, Australia, passed away peacefully on Wednesday July 20, 2016 aged 78 years. Fr Paul was professed as a Paulist Missionary on October 9, 1977 and ordained to the Priesthood on July 9, 1978. He served faithfully as a Paulist Missionary Priest for 38 years in Malta, Pakistan and Australia.

Fr Ivano Burdian, MSSP Provincial, wrote this letter to his brother priests on Wednesday 20th July after Fr Paul's death:

Dear brothers,

I have to convey the very sad news that Paul Kierce died this morning after 2 and a half years of struggle with cancer.

Paul had a fall last Thursday and was hospitalised. He was very weak and was placed in the Palliative care ward. He had some good days and bad. Yesterday he was very tired. This morning he had a turn and died at about 10.00am our time.

Last night as I was walking home after visiting him I was struggling to focus on the rosary when it struck me how they (the 5 sorrowful mysteries) reflected Paul's own journey these last 2 and a half years.

He went through the agony of the discovery of the original bowel cancer and the consequences of it spreading in the body, especially as they could not cure him but at best prolong life. He had to revisit the agony as news progressively got worse including the definitive news that the chemo was no longer useful and to enter Palliative care. The last time was the news he would not be coming home any more. While at times it was a struggle for him, he embraced these moments with faith.

His body was scourged with the cancers, the chemo, nausea, falls, infections, and God knows what else, he may not have liked it, especially being in hospital, but he embraced them with faith. His mind was pierced with confusion, tiredness, sometimes dementia like symptoms and again he struggled through them with faith.

From the beginning of this Calvary he carried the cross without too much complaint and in Paulish fashion, trying not to be centre of attention. My suspicion is that these last few days he began feeling pain at times, but didn't want others to be put out. While he may have been tied with the rope of cancer and led down a road he would have preferred not to go, he walked it with faith and trust in his God.

These last few days he finished his 5th mystery getting ready for the final step home.

Its been a privilege to walk with him on this path, he has been a witness to me and helped me to break open some of my own selfishness and preconceptions. It has also been nourishing for me to see all the people that have expressed their love for Paul or who have been touched by him and his ministry.

I have no doubt that Paul now joins all our other brothers in the kingdom and I am sure he now prays both for our ongoing mission in Australia and for all of us. Keep his brother Peter in your prayers, this is the second brother he has lost to cancer. Take care and God bless.

r Andrew Camilleri, Parish Priest of St Clare's Parish in Thomastown West, passed away suddenly aged 69 years on Thursday 8 September 2016, the Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Mgr Greg Bennet, Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Melbourne wrote the following appreciation:

Dear Friends

I write to convey the sad news that Fr Andrew Camilleri PP, St Clare's, Thomastown West died during the night at the presbytery. In recent days, Fr Andrew had been very unwell and had been kindly cared for by his staff, friends and parishioners. His death has come as a shock to all of them.

Fr Andrew was ordained as a Salesian priest in 1981 at St John's [Co-]Cathedral, Valetta, Malta.

In 1990 following the death of his mother, Fr Andrew wrote to Archbishop Little seeking an opportunity to serve in the Archdiocese of Melbourne and expressing his desire to undertake parish ministry for one year, which was duly approved.

Later in 1990, Fr Andrew was appointed to St Peter's, Hoppers Crossing with Fr Dom DeGiorgio, which provided a warm welcome to Melbourne and proved his desire to remain with us. He was incardinated as a priest of the Archdiocese in 1994.

Throughout his ministry in Melbourne, Fr Andrew served as Assistant Priest in Hoppers Crossing, Fawkner North, Administrator of Thomastown West (2005) and later as Parish Priest from 2006 until his death.

Fr Andrew was a kind, hospitable and pastoral priest. You can take the man out of Malta, but you can't take Malta out of the man! His ministry was to his people and he created a sense of the "village" by his dedicated fidelity and pastoral kindness towards his people. He enjoyed the company and friendship of his parishioners, finding many ways to celebrate the events of life.

The Archdiocese has been blessed by the witness of those good priests who came from Malta to serve among us. The esprit de corps among the Maltese priests is legendary and Fr Andrew, who was larger than life in so many ways, was always the life of the party. His physical stature was matched by his generosity, kindness and welcome.

We join the people of St Clare's who will mourn the death of their pastor. While we are sad to learn of his unexpected death, we know his desire was always to remain among his people and so it was until the very end.

We can only imagine that he will enjoy the promise of the eternal banquet!

Hear with favour our prayers, which we humbly offer, 0 Lord, for the salvation of the soul of Fr Andrew Camilleri, your servant and priest, that he, who devoted a faithful ministry to your name, may rejoice in the perpetual company of your saints.

Our community mourns the loss of Lillian Calleja

he Maltese community in Melbourne mourns the loss of Lillian Calleja OAM, a prominent member of the community who passed away peacefully, aged 85 years, on 24 June 2016 with her family by her side.

The following is an edited version of the eulogy delivered at her funeral by Mr George Saliba OAM, President of the Newport Maltese Association:

I have been a good friend and colleague with Vince and Lillian Calleja for over 50 years. Lillian was well-known among members of the Maltese community of this State, especially among those in the western suburbs of Melbourne for many reasons.

Lillian Calleja had an incredible life. She was born on 15th April 1931 in Valletta, the capital city of Malta. She was the eldest child in a family of 14 children born to Michael and Theresa Pace.

Her dad was a well-known magician in Malta, who used to perform on stage under the name of Chris van Burn. Being the eldest child, Lillian used to assist her father onstage performing. So at a very young age Lillian developed a passion to help make people socially happy, a passion that she carried right through her life.

One morning on a bright sunny day in 1947, when Lillian was 16 yrs old, she was having a stroll at the lower Barracca Gardens in Valletta, not far from where the family lived. There she met this tall handsome policeman by the name of Vince (Ċensinu, as she used to call him). They fell in love and, in 1953 they got married.

In 1955, like many other Maltese families at the time, they decided to migrate to Australia with their 9 month old daughter Marija, seeking a better future. They settled in the Melbourne suburb of Newport. A year after their arrival they welcomed in the family their new baby girl, Natalin.

For a good number of Maltese, who settled in Newport, the Sacred Heart Church in Newcastle Street was the focal point to meet and have a chat after Sunday mass.

As it happened, in 1973, a member of the Missionary Society of St Paul by the name of Fr Victor Shields was attached to the parish, serving members of the Maltese community. *In his wisdom he saw the need to form an* organisation that can cater socially for the Maltese to become known as the Newport Maltese Association.

Lillian and her husband Vince were founding members of the newly formed association, showing great enthusiasm and full of eagerness. Lillian was the logical choice to take over the social secretary portfolio of the committee as there was never any doubt about her ability to hold such a



position. For the next 40 years she carried out her duties with great determination and passion. She never refused to take on any task allocated to her and she never let the association down.

Lillian was so proud to be a member of an association and proud of the fact that she belonged to an organisation that was very successful in raising funds for the construction of the Maltese Community Centre in Parkville. There is no doubt that she played a big part in the establishment of the Newport Maltese Association and for that, we, the sons and daughters of Newport, will always be grateful for her long standing commitments.

Lillian was a very amicable person, always ready to help. Her involvement in fund raising—and her dedication to the Maltese community did not stop with the Newport group. For a number of years, she served as vice president of the Ladies Auxiliaries of the MCCV, working hard to do her part again in raising funds for the Centre in Parkville.

As a member of the Maltese Cultural Festival Committee, Lillian took on the task of organising the children's concert. She was always looking for new talent and giving them the chance to further develop their talent in drama, comedy, music, dancing and singing. Thanks to Lillian, today some of those youngsters have made a name for themselves in the world of entertainment.

For many years, Lillian organised the Christmas Eve Children's Pageant that took place at the Centre in Parkville, again involving young members of our community. Using her dress making expertise (and she was an excellent seamstress), she always managed to involve young children dressed in Maltese national costumes to take part in the celebrations of Our Lady of Victories feast celebrated in September every year at St Mary's church in West Melbourne.

Amazingly, Lillian managed to do all this without neglecting her family duties —as a wife, mother, grandmother.

Naturally, Lillian's valuable contributions to our community over the years did not go unnoticed.

In 1990. Harmonic 65 Culture Club Incorporated bestowed upon Lillian the Manoel de Vilhena award under the patronage of the then Prime Minister of Malta Dr Eddie Fenech Adami. The award was for her dedication to teaching song and dance to young members of our community.

In the year 2000 The City of Brimbank recognised Lillian's tireless contributions to the community over the years by awarding her the Citizen of the Year Award.

On the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the State of Victoria, the Victorian Government presented Lillian with a certificate of appreciation in recognition for voluntary work to the community.

On the 12th May 2011 at Government House in Melbourne Lillian was the proud recipient of the Order of Australia Medal for services to the Maltese community awarded to her on Australia Day earlier that year. But one of Lillian's proudest moments in her life was when pope John Paul II, now a saint, visited Australia and she was selected to meet him and receive holy communion from His Holiness dressed in a Maltese national costume.

Lillian loved the Maltese community with everything she possessed, she loved everything that is Maltese culture and traditions. However, above everything, she reserved her biggest love for her husband Vince, her two daughters Marija and Natalin, her son-in-law Ray, grandchildren Adam and David and their spouses.

For 63 years Lillian and Vince were inseparable. They did everything together and they truly observed those immortal words "for better or for worse" (in Maltese, kienu gieshom id-di u id-do).

In April 2012 Lillian reluctantly and with great sadness had to resign from the Newport Maltese Association because of illhealth. For the next 4 years it was heartbreaking for her husband Vince, their family members and everyone that knew Lillian to watch her health gradually deteriorating.

Lillian's journey on earth came to an end on Friday 24th June---she passed away peacefully at 8.10 in the evening surrounded by Vince and all the family members, leaving behind so many beautiful memories that will last all of us a lifetime

Lillian, for all those years you dedicated your time and energy to help make a better world for our community, we hope that the all mighty will award you with a golden pass to the gates of heaven.

May she rest in peace! ♦

Earthquakes and Tsunamis in Malta

HA President Joseph Borg introduced his talk with an introduction to Plate Tectonic Theory.

The solid earth we know is just a thin crust, floating on molten rock, called *magma*. The crust is cracked like a broken egg shell and the pieces, called *plates*, move around in different directions, driven by convection currents, warm magma rising and cool magma sinking. These slow but powerful forces cause volcanoes and earthquakes, especially at the edges of the plates.

Present earthquakes and faulting in the Mediterranean area are a result of the African and European plates slowly swinging together, pushing up mountains. Although no igneous rocks are found in Malta it is surrounded by many active volcanoes, including Mt Etna, Stromboli and Lipari, Mt Vesuvius, Pantelleria, and Santorini.

Until 12 million years ago The Maltese islands were underneath the Tethys Sea, being formed by sedimentation of sand, stone, clays, and limestone. The islands dip 4 degrees to the N.E. probably due to heaving of the Pantelleria rift system. The Mediterranean had dried up completely on two occasions, forming deep layers of salt in the deeper basins. Until about 20,000 years ago, Malta was connected to Sicily.

Malta is crossed by two main fault systems. The older of the two, the

Great Fault, trends SW to NE, while the Maghlaq Fault system trends approximately NW to SE along the southern coast of the island and was responsible for the downthrow of Filfla to sea level. A system of horst and graben structures of East Northeast trend characterises Malta north of the Great Fault.

Localised earthquakes can also occur with the collapse of cliffs and caves or explosions. Tremors were caused by the cave-in of subterranean hollows (sink holes) such as that at Maqluba on 23 November 1343, the cave-in at Bahrija

which killed a boy and several sheep in 1923 and landslips, like that which occurred at Ghajn Tuffieha in 1980. Explosions can also shake local areas.

Many earthquakes have shaken Malta but the seven that caused most damage were:

1542: An earthquake from Eastern Sicily was felt strongly in Malta and a number of single storey buildings collapsed.


1693: A magnitude 7.4 earthquake from Eastern Sicily damaged most buildings in Valletta, some seriously; several church domes collapsed; Mdina and the Cathedral were seriously damaged. Parts of cliff faces reportedly fell into the sea.

1743: An earthquake from the Ionian Sea damaged Mdina cathedral and numerous churches in Malta and Gozo. Many hillsides collapsed.

1856: A magnitude 7.7 earthquake from Crete seriously cracked many houses in Malta and Gozo, especially the upper floors, and damaged church domes and walls, especially St George in Gozo.

1886: A week long earthquake from the Aegean Sea damaged the Court of Justice in Valletta, some churches, many houses, and the Mdina Cathedral.

1911: An earthquake from the Continued on page 11

Northwest of Gozo was strongly felt in Gozo. It caused significant damage to domes and houses and damaged Fort Chambray. It was much less damaging in Malta.

1923: An earthquake from the east of Malta was mostly felt around the Harbour area. It caused non-structural damage to churches and cracks in walls.


Mr Borg then drew on his engineering background to describe the desirable features of buildings in earthquake zones:

their composition, foundations, dimensions and mass. Elastic bodies are better suited to carry vibrations than solid/brittle ones. Foundations help to stabilise buildings and absorb the shaking. Buildings should have shear connections. Steel structures are better than concrete or stone. He expressed concern about high rise buildings made from ferro-concrete; with concrete of poor quality and steel reinforcing subject to concrete cancer. Structures over 3 made from unreinforced masonry, with heavy concrete flooring/ roofing, and large open basements, are very susceptible to collapse in the event of the ground shaking.

Mr Borg went on to describe Tsunamis. These large waves are caused by submarine earthquakes, landslides, cliff-falls into the sea, volcanic explosions or asteroid impact into the ocean. Many reports and geological evidence show that Malta has been hit by tsunamis in the past. For example, the action of these high waves has moved large boulders to higher places.

In the open sea, the waves travel at speeds up to 700 km/h and are not very high. As they approach the shallower water of the shore, the wave height increases and the velocity slows, so that wave crests are closer together. The first indication of a tsunami is when the sea recedes for some distance. The water then rushes in at speed, a high wave followed by others in succession. It smashes ashore, sweeping everything in its path. It can travel inland for quite some distance depending on the terrain. The run-up height is higher when

funnelled into a V-shaped inlet (such as Xlendi Bay) or a U-shaped one (such as Marsaxlokk Bay).

of recorded Mediterranean tsunamis have been damaging. In AD 365, a Mag 7.7 earthquake in Crete created a tsunami which caused extensive damage in Libya, Egypt, Calabria and Spain. This tsunami is unique in the historical record, as it across propagated the entire Mediterranean without major attenuation. Malta must have been affected.

Tsunami heights exceeding 20m have been reported in the Eastern Mediterranean. Thera's explosion supposedly wiped out the Minoan Civilisation in Crete, and the Messina Earthquake of 1908 (Mag 7.5) caused waves 8.5 m high on the Sicilian coast and more than 10m high on the Calabrian coast. This area averages about 10 tsunamis per 100 years and the last tsunami was recorded in 1954

The strongest tsunamis are excited in the Aegean Sea and the Hellenic and Calabrian areas. Overall, large tsunamis are less frequent than in the Pacific Ocean. Expected heights of tsunamis in the more exposed parts of the Mediterranean are: 100 years – 1.5m high, 500 years – 4 m high, 1000 years – 7 m high.

De Soldanis reports that in the 1693 Earthquake the sea at Xlendi receded for a whole mile then rushed back in as a tremendous wave with thunderous sound. Miraculously, no lives were lost. If it happened now, there would be great loss of property and life, due to building developments and many tourists on the

shoreline.

The 1908 Earthquake of Messina did not cause any major structural damage but reports suggest that a 5ft high wave hit the island, with the water receding and returning several times at Marsamxett Harbour. Houses were inundated in Gzira, Sliema and Msida and serious flooding was reported at Marsaxlokk.

In 1973, fishermen and residents in Salina Bay reported

a marine disturbance, which old fishermen called 'il-milghuba', and which was alleged to have also taken place a few years previously. At 3 a.m. the sea level dropped by a couple of feet. A short while later a massive wave caused the sea to rise a couple of feet above the normal level. A rumbling noise was heard.

Due to climate change, water levels could rise up to 0.6 m above present level by the end of the century. Low lying areas, such as Pwales, Marsaxlokk and Birżebbuġa will be inundated. Loss of land, loss of water purity, especially in water tables close to sea, dying off of plant life in coastal areas, and greater impacts of storms and tidal surges will ensue. Over time as the sea warms, it will expand. Combined with the ice caps melting, the sea level could rise up to 4m over the next 500 years. •

Pope Francis speaks out

Welcoming Refugees

uring the first official event of his five-day visit to Poland for World Youth Day, Pope Francis urged the country's political leaders to welcome migrants fleeing from wars and hunger, while at the same time protecting human life from conception until natural death. The Pope's words came as he met with the nation's president, prime minister and other political leaders in the courtyard of Krakow's historic Wawel Castle complex.

Pope Francis said: "The complex phenomenon of migration calls for great wisdom and compassion, in order to overcome fear and to achieve the greater good...Also needed is a spirit of readiness to welcome those fleeing from wars and hunger, and solidarity with those deprived of their fundamental rights, including the right to profess one's faith in freedom and safety. At the same time, new forms of exchange and cooperation need to be developed on the international level in order to resolve the conflicts and wars that force so many people to leave their homes and their native lands. This means doing everything possible to alleviate the suffering while tirelessly working with wisdom and constancy for justice and peace, bearing witness in practice to human and Christian values."

New work of mercy enshrined in first papal message for creation

o mark the September 1st day of prayer for creation, Pope Francis has added a new work of mercy for Catholics to perform: caring for our common home, the planet and all its inhabitants.

At a press conference, Cardinal Peter Turkson, head of the new Vatican office for Promoting Integral Human Development, and Bishop Brian Farrell from the Council for Christian Unity, introduced the Pope's message for this annual observance, together with Irish author Terence Ward.

'It's not every day that you have a new work of mercy in the Catholic Church!' That was how the new director of the Vatican press office, American Greg Burke introduced the briefing, focused on the papal message entitled 'Show Mercy to our Common Home'.

Since biblical times, Christians have been called to carry out 6 acts of mercy, listed in St Matthew's Gospel – giving food and drink to the hungry and thirsty, welcoming the stranger, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and the prisoners – with a 7th one, burying the dead, added in medieval times.

Now the new papal message adds an eighth one to that list, possibly the most significant of them: "Caring for our Common Home. Groundbreaking and visionary, ecumenical and ecological. One could argue that this is the highest work of mercy because it includes all the others, a modern work of mercy for our modern epoch."

As Bishop Brian Farrell explained, it's an issue around which there is broad ecumenical agreement throughout the Christian world, with **Ecumenical** Patriarch Bartholomew other Orthodox leaders pioneering many groundbreaking initiatives raise about critical awareness ecological concerns.

This first every papal message for the day of prayer for creation calls for mercy as the key to unlocking that 'ecological conversion' of our hearts that Pope John Paul first called for a quarter of a century ago. It's a step by step process which begins by recognizing the harm we have already done through our selfish, irresponsible and greedy behaviour..

"The first step in this process is to humbly acknowledge the harm we are doing to the earth through pollution, the scandalous destruction of ecosystems and loss of biodiversity, and the spectre of climate change—which seems nearer and more dangerous with each passing year. And to realize that when we hurt the earth, we also hurt the poor, whom God loves without limit"

After acknowledging the harm done and confessing our sins, we are then called to change our lives, beginning with the small changes that can lower our own carbon footprint, while also advocating for an economic and political system that is just and sustainable, rather than focused on short term financial and electoral gains.

The proliferation of hotbeds of violence produces most serious negative social consequences. The Holy Father sums up this situation in the expression: "A Third World War in Pieces". Peace, by contrast, promotes social positive consequences and it allows the achievement of real progress. Therefore, we should act within what is possible, and negotiate ways of peace even where they seem tortuous and impractical. Thus, non-violence can acquire a more comprehensive and new meaning. It will not only consist of desire, of moral rejection of

Such a political method is based on the primacy of law. If the rights and the equal dignity of every person are safeguarded without any discrimination and distinction, then non-violence, understood as a political method, can constitute a realistic way to overcome arm conflicts. In this perspective, it becomes important to increasingly recognize not the right of force but the force of right.

violence, barriers, destructive impulses, but

also of a realistic political method that gives

rise to hope.

With this Message, Pope Francis wants to show a further step, a path of hope, appropriate to today's historical circumstances. In this way, the settlement of disputes may be reached through negotiation without then degenerating into armed conflict. Within such a perspective the culture and identity of Peoples are respected and the opinion that some are morally superior to others is overcome.

At the same time, however, it does not mean that one Nation can remain indifferent to the tragedies of another. Rather it means a recognition of the primacy of diplomacy over the noise of arms.

Arms trade is so widespread that it is generally underestimated. Illegal arms trafficking supports not a few world's conflicts. Non-violence as a political style can and must do much to stem this scourge.

The World Peace Day was initiated by Pope Paul VI and is celebrated on the first day of January. The Holy Father's Message is sent to all Foreign Ministries of the world and it indicates the diplomatic concerns of the Holy See during the coming year.

It-tabib jehtieg li jeżaminak u jaghmel testijiet li hemm bżonn biex jara x'inhi l-problema u jaghtik il-kura li jehtieg.
