Dear Members and Friends of the MHA,

I hope this newsletter finds you as well and happy as possible in the circumstances. COVID continues to dominate our lives, here and in Malta as well as the rest of the world. Presently, restrictions in Melbourne are being lifted, while elsewhere they are being increased.

At the start of the outbreak, Malta had been held up as the poster child of Europe's first wave success. New cases went down to 0. Restrictions were eased, as Europe and Malta opened to travel and tourism. Towards the end of July, a second wave started amongst young adult revellers in Paceville and at the Festa of St Venera. With many new cases, Malta soon became known as a COVID hotspot. At the time of writing, Malta has recorded 364,249 swab tests since the start of the pandemic. There are 1980 active cases with the 20 to 40 age group over-represented. Sadly, most of the 78 deaths so far have been those aged over 70. Further information and a day by day breakdown can be found here.

Difficult times can bring out the best in people and the MHA is no exception. Your historical association has entered the 21st Century! We had our first ever Zoom committee meeting recently, and it was followed two days later with a practice PowerPoint presentation. All went well. We then held a practice session with our members, which was a bit of a disaster due to technical issues. The following Tuesday, 17th October, we held a meeting at our regular scheduled time. 17 members signed in and enjoyed over an hour of conversation. This may be the way of the future, especially as lectures can be recorded with both visuals and sound. Membership fees have been waived for this financial year. The MHA donated \$400 to the MCCV Home Visitation Scheme towards the provision of Christmas Hampers, as visits were unable to be made for most of this year.

September saw the Feast of the Nativity of Mary on 8th September. Also known as the Festa ta' Marija Bambina and Our Lady of Victories, the commemoration is special to the Maltese, as it celebrates the end of

the Great Siege of 1565, and the 1943 surrender of Italy in WWII. For many years, the feast has been celebrated on the second Sunday of September at the Star of the Sea church in West Melbourne. Organised by Reskeon Seniors on behalf of the Missionary Society of Saint Paul, this was the first time in many years that the celebration was not held. The photos are from 2019.

We sadly bade farewell to Charles (Carmel) Portelli, who passed on the eve of the Nativity of Our Lady. He will long be remembered for his contribution to the Maltese Community. An early member of the MCCV, he served on the executive committee for many years as social secretary and treasurer. Dedicated to the Maltese Community, he was instrumental in gaining funding for the Community Centre in Parkville. 

VALE CHARLES (CARMEL) PORTELLI (1926 – 2020)

Carmel (Charles) Portelli was born in 1926 and studied in the Seminary in Malta, intending to be a priest. One day, while traveling on the bus, he saw the beautiful Edith Alice Carter outside her home. He fell instantly in



love and the young couple married in 1948, a marriage that would last over 70 years. Their first son sadly died at only 5 weeks old. They had a daughter, Carmen, then came to Australia in 1951. Their younger son, Harold, was born in Australia later that same year. The four set up home in Port Melbourne, then later in Patterson Lakes and finally in Middle Park.

In 1953, Edith and Charles met Paul Paris, who was organising functions to bring the Maltese Community together. After a few years, because of his age, Paul decided to hand over to younger people. In 1965, Charles was asked to join the Maltese Community Council of Victoria and was elected Social Secretary. In this capacity, he raised many thousands of dollars towards the building of a permanent centre for the Maltese Community at Parkville, on the site owned by the Missionary Society of St Paul.

Charles organised many functions, with up to 800 people attending. He also organised a very successful Miss Maltese Community Quest. All the money raised from these events went directly towards the cost of building the Community Centre, which would finally open in 1983. With facilities for functions, meeting rooms, offices and a library, the Centru Malti has hosted many dignitaries from Australia and overseas and served the Community very well for a long time.

In the 1970s, Charles became Assistant Treasurer of the MCCV, as he was by that time a qualified accountant, and later auditor. He donated his time assisting members of the community with their tax returns. In a voluntary capacity he also looked after the books for the MCCV, the Rosary Home for the aged in the Western suburbs of Melbourne, and also for Maltese Nuns in Sydney, travelling at his own expense.

In 1974, Charles founded a new Maltese Club, the Maltese La Vallette Association. The club was very successful and drew in many people in the South-eastern suburbs of Melbourne and is still going strong today. In the 80's and 90's and into the 2000's, Charles coordinated fetes highlighting Maltese Arts and Crafts. He became unwell in 2012, with a chronic lung condition, and was reluctantly unable to carry on in any capacity of responsibility. He and Edith continued to be involved with the Community by attending functions whenever they could.

A devout man who was devoted to the church of Mt Carmel and to the mother of God, Charles passed away 5 minutes before midnight on the eve of the Nativity of Our Lady. We pray that he was welcomed into Her arms. After many years of service to the Maltese Community and to his family, may he rest in eternal peace.


From the Pen of Georgina Scillio

Malta 1947

The King is coming!

The King is coming to our school. His Majesty King George the Sixth of England, Chief Commander of the British Commonwealth, is visiting our Primary School in a few weeks' time! We need to get ready. Spruce up the classroom, Make sure that the everything is sparkling clean. Our uniforms spotless, ironed, our hair neat and tidy....

We will decorate the classroom. Bring flowers on the day. Our teacher suggested that we place a table in one corner of the room, cover it with a nice cloth and put vases full of flowers....

To my great joy, my family rug, *it-tapit*, has been chosen for the decorated table. Now this is no ordinary rug—thickly woven with brightly coloured silk threads on a gold background, it represents an extravagant desert scene. Dunes so well depicted you can almost see the grains of sands. There are palm trees lush with dates, fronds perfectly sewn. There are birds hovering over the clear water. An oasis in the desert.

There are Sheiks sitting upright on magnificent camels, all decorated with jewels. The camel handlers are wearing flowing white robes and turbans but are barefoot, while the haughty Sheiks have jewelled sandals. The tassels on the edges of the rug are long and silky. And all this is hand woven on a soft but thick material. A masterpiece of colour and of lavish work

How this rug has come into our possession, I have no idea. Someone must have given it to us in lieu of payment, or as a thank you for some great favour done. *It-tapit*, with its strong smell of camphor, comes out of a drawer on very special occasions only. It is draped over the Singer sewing machine, not only showing that something festive is happening, but also that the source of mother's work is covered, hidden from view. The *tapit* is large enough to touch the ground, hiding the treadle of the sewing machine: for my overworked mother it means she is on holiday!

The Governor, the King and a host of other dignitaries arrive at our school... two hours late. Standing to attention in straight rows, unable to move in the blazing sun, we are thirsty, hungry and about to faint. His Majesty has been kept longer than he had expected at another establishment. He had visited the war ruins. Later on we learn that he was so overwhelmed by the extent of the war damage, that he stayed and talked to several people he had not been scheduled to meet.

Now he is to see our school, and the wonderful things British education is doing to us....

Just as the King is arriving in his big black car, I and another girl faint, and we are taken elsewhere to recover. Naturally, we must not spoil the parade by doing something terrible like getting sick in front of the King himself!

I have to be satisfied with a view of the King and his retinue from upstairs as he crosses the quadrangle. Just seeing the hair parting on his well-groomed head is enough to give us a thrill. There is no mistaking which one is the King. His Majesty is the most recognizable personage - the face on our coins, his picture on our classrooms' walls.

'Did the King see the *tapit?*' I ask the others, the lucky ones who have been in the same room as the King.

'Oh yes!'

'Did he say anything?'

'He said something about the nice classroom.'



'Yes, but what about the tapit, did he notice how beautiful it is?'

To lessen my disappointment at having missed the main event, someone says:

'Oh yes, he said how pretty the horses are.'

I know she is lying, it is camels and not horses which are depicted on the rug. A King who governs almost the whole World would know a horse from a camel, I'm sure.

'Did the King actually, actually come near the table, I mean did he...did he actually touch the rug?' I ask over


again, my heart in my throat in anticipation.

'Well...'

If the King had only just done that, if he had only just brushed past the table, past our rug, our wonderful *tapit*, that would be ecstasy enough for me. It would be like imbuing it with magic.

The visit of His Majesty is the topic of conversation for weeks and weeks later. We had to write essays and poems about it. Stories of how the King had touched someone's head, or shaken someone's hand or smiled at someone, or talked to someone, have become so exaggerated that in the end we realize that, like a fairy tale, they cannot all be true.

King George VI reigned from 1936 to 1952. He awarded the George Cross to Malta in a handwritten letter during the peak of hostilities in World War 2

<u>A time to recall and rejoice... with limited celebrations</u> by Neil Zammit describes the history of L'Unione Philharmonic founded in 1880 by maestro Vincenzo Camilleri and his four sons.

The aircraft that returned from the depths: The story of Hawker Hurricane Mark IIA Z 3055 by Jeffrey Sammut. Early in the morning of 4 July 1941, 23-year-old Sgt Thomas Hackston took off from Safi in bad weather but was never seen again. Wreckage just off the Hamrija Coastal Tower, close to Wied iż-Żurrieq showed engine failure. The young pilot had brought the plane down smoothly and escaped from the cockpit, but he was never found. The article describes the complicated recovery and restoration of the plane.

Royal events in old Maltese postcards <u>Part 1</u>, <u>Part 2</u>, <u>Part 3</u> by Giovanni Bonello shows events in Malta after the invention of photography in 1839.

<u>Inside Dom Mintoff's villa</u> Stephanie Fsadni visits Yana Mintoff, the daughter of the former Labour leader and prime minister, Dom Mintoff, for insight into their life, house and garden, and the impact of nearby developments.

<u>Leo Amery's visit to Malta in 1919</u> by Brian Blouet. Following the 1919 riots in Malta, the Colonial Secretary, Lord Milner, dispatched his Undersecretary of State, Leo S. Amery, to the islands to seek remedies. He found the imperial government was directly to blame. He convinced the Colonial Office to provide funds to Malta's civil government and worked with Filippo Sceberras (later Sir Filippo) on a new constitution giving self-government. Sadly, the 1921 constitution was abandoned in the political turmoil of the 1930s.

<u>Maltese women in the books of the Knights – the first 50 years</u> by Giovanni Bonello. The National Library in Valletta houses the archives of the Order of Malta, including minutes of their meetings, the Libri Conciliarum. Women featured mostly in crimes committed against them, many by the Knights themselves.

Mr. Joseph Borg gave the President's Report for 2019. A summary follows:

At the last AGM the committee was elected: President - Joseph Borg; Vice-President - Robert Blythe; Secretary - Charles Gatt; Treasurer - Mario Bonnici; Committee Members - George Portelli and Charles Portelli.

Joe requested new speakers to please contact us. We have a list of topics since inception, and it is possible to revisit topics with a different emphasis.

We advertise our activities on Facebook and on our web page. The 2019 AGM will be held on the 19th of November. Joe urged members to attend and to consider nominating for a position. The 2020 program will be organised by the incoming committee. We look forward to keeping the interest level high and attracting visitors. Lectures are free and anyone is welcome.

Treasurer's Report:

Mario Bonnici presented the Treasurers Report to June 2019. Expenses included the website, and donations to Maltese DownUnder, 3ZZZ, and the MCCV. Income \$579.95, Expenses \$955.39, Balance \$4225.69

Election of Office-bearers and Committee Members:

Frances Bonnici supervised the election. All nominees were elected unopposed. The committee remains the same as in the previous year.

Agenda Items:

- 1. **Donation to MCCV.** Due to reduced income, the donation to the MCCV is reduced to \$200, to go towards the home visitation scheme. The Maltese Language Group and the Maltese Historical Association are not profit-making organisations but provide a cultural aspect to the MCCV and the Maltese community.
- 2. Donation to 3ZZZ radio: \$50 was approved

General Business:

Joe Borg proposed putting a motion to the MCCV AGM that Victor Borg's contribution to the MCCV be reflected by renaming the Centru Malti the Victor Borg Centre. There was general agreement.

The MCCV is having a second market day on Sunday the 1st of December. Mario Bonnici attended the first one and said there were lots of young families. It was suggested that the MHA have a table. We will try to have the \$30 fee waived, as we are not a commercial organisation. We can put on a slideshow, have a presepju (crib), Joe Borg's model of Valletta, etc. Frances Bonnici suggested activities for children, food etc. Charles Gatt has produced a brochure, Mary Sciberras mentioned radio advertising.
