A Slice of Malta's History

Did you know that before man's arrival, the Maltese Islands are believed to have been part of a land bridge connecting Europe to Africa.

This is evidenced by fossil remains of prehistoric animals, which suggest their overland migration from one continent to the other.

Ghar Dalam known as the **"Cave of Darkness"** located just outside the town of **Birzebbuga**, shows evidence that Malta formed part of a bridge connecting the two continents. A small museum at the top of this impressive archaeological site displays the fossil remains of thousands 0f pre-historic animals, including dwarf elephants and red deer, that roamed Malta 170, 000 years ago.

Other finds at **Ghar Dalam** include human remains, which suggest that the early Neolithic settlers in Malta may have buried their dead here.

It is believed that the first human settlers were probably Sicilian **Farmers** who came over to Malta, sometime around 4000 B. C. The subsequent generations of these Neolithic people built impressive temples of stone that can still be seen at places like **Haqar Qim** on Malta and Ggantija on the Island of Gozo.

One particularly stunning complex left by these amazing prehistoric people is the **Hypogeum** at the town of **Paola** (**Rahal Gdid**), a temple modelled on other sites but carved entirely underground.

The Hypogeum, was discovered in 1902 by workers digging a **cistern** (reservoir for water) is one of the most fascinating and unique prehistoric sites on Malta. It's definitely worth a visit.

History also tells us that the temple builders apparently, disappeared without a trace around 2000 B. C.


What a special night it was.

INTERESTING AUSTRALIA FACTS





In the area (land); Australia is **32 times** greater than that of the U.K, almost **twice** than that of Europe, and almost **equal** to that of the <u>United States of America</u>.

Australia has **the lowest population density** in the world—two people per square kilometre.

Australia is **the only continent-nation** in the world. It means, it is a continent and an independent country as well. It is also the smallest, flattest, and driest inhabited continent in the world.

If you know Australia's total population, you can clearly see that **the population of kangaroos in the country outnumbers that of the humans**. And there are strict measures in place to check the population of the national animal.

In Australia, you can undergo **a unique health treatment** which is expected to be **40,000 years old**. These Aboriginal cultures and healing techniques are believed to be the oldest in the world. Difficulties and illnesses such as depression, cancer and substance abuse can be treated with these century's old techniques.

The longest fence in the world is in Australia and it is 5,530 kilometers in length. It is called the 'dingo fence'.



In Australia, they have **a town named '1770'**. Yeah, the name just contains digits. The town is a six-hour drive north from Brisbane along the coast of Central Queensland.

Spanning 2000 km from Halls Creek to Wiluna in outback WA, the Canning Stock Route is **the longest** and most remote stock route in the world.



Traditional Maltese Kwarezimal Recipe (Lenten Biscuits) (Gf, Df)

Kwarezimal is a traditional Maltese recipe enjoyed during the Lent period, hence 'Lenten Biscuits'.

They are a delicious blend of almonds, citrus, sugar, and mixed spices which are then glazed with honey and topped with more almonds.

Ingredients

- 5 cups pure ground almonds (750g)
- 1 1/4 cup granulated sugar (250g)
- 2 tsp cocoa powder
- 2 tsp mixed spice and 2 tsp cinnamon
- 2 medium eggs, room temp. (or water as needed)
- Zest and juice of 1 orange
- 2 tsp orange blossom water
- 2 tsp pure vanilla extract
- 2 tsp almond liquor (optional)

Honey, to glaze

Chopped roasted almonds, to top Bottom of Form



Instructions

Preheat oven to 175°c. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

In a large bowl, mix the almonds, sugar, cocoa and spices together until thoroughly combined. In a separate bowl, mix the remaining wet ingredients together.

Make a well in the centre of the dry ingredients and pour in the wet mixture, a little at a time until it forms a dough by hand. You might not need to use all of the wet mixture.

Divide the dough into 6 equal portions. Roll each into a log shape. (Do not flatten, it will spread out in the oven on its own). Make horizontal criss-cross dents on the top with the back of a knife.

Bake for around 12-14 minutes in the middle rack, then move to a higher rack and bake for another 2-4 minutes. Do not over-bake or it will harden. Take out of the oven and brush immediately with honey. Sprinkle the tops with chopped roasted almonds.

Let cool completely before serving. Enjoy!

Note:

Store in a sealed container in a cool dry place for up to a week. Freeze for longer storage. Size: Approx. 12cm x 4cm.

Note: You can use mixed ground almonds if you do not have pure. If you do not want to use eggs, you can use water. Add it slowly at the end, as needed until it all comes together.


