THE VICTORIA LINES

Most of us would have heard about "The great wall of China" which was built over centuries by China`s Emperors to protect their territory.

Well, I`m sure you will be interested to know, that **Malta** has its own "Great Wall" of course on a much smaller scale than that of China. Its name: -<u>**The Victoria Lines.**</u>

Below I have written a summary of the history of the lines, so here I go. Originally known as the <u>North West Front</u> consisting of line of fortifications that spans 12 kilometers along the width of Malta, dividing the north of the Island from the more heavily populated south.

Built by the British Military between 1875 and 1885, during the administration of his Excellency General Sir Arthur Lyon Freemantle, the lines were named to commemorate the jubilee of Queen Victoria.


The line cut across MALTA FROM THE EAST TO THE WEST. It was designed to present a physical barrier to **invading forces** landing in the n**orth of Malta**, with intention of attacking the harbor installation, so vital for the maintenance of the British Fleet. (during that time the British Fleet occupied both harbors on the island) Military Exercises staged in May 1900, revealed that the Victoria Lines were of dubious defensive and by 1907 they were abandoned altogether. But when World War Two started, a Nazi invasion seemed likely, so the lines were rehabilitated, and new ground posts built along the lines. Fortunately, the line was never tested.

To- day large parts of the fortification walls have collapsed, although some parts in the countryside remain intact and in general the Victoria Lines have fallen into obscurity. (what a pity).

In 1996, the Government of Malta submitted the Victoria Lines to UNESCO, for consideration as a World Heritage Site and in 2019 the Malta Tourism Authority proposed that trails along the Lines will become Malta`s inaugural national walkway.

Ingredients

Pastry

- 500g plain flour
- 227g cold butter, grated
- 150g caster sugar
- Zest of 1 large lemon
- 2 tsp pure vanilla extract
- 2 medium egg yolks

60ml water

Other Ingredients

- 2 tbsp milk of choice, to brush the pastry
- 400g white chocolate, chopped
- 2 tbsp flavorless oil
- Food coloring gels for the white chocolate
- Food coloring powders for the speckles (optional)
- 1/2 tsp vodka to mix with the powders (optional)

TRADITIONAL MALTESE FIGOLLI

Instructions

Preparing the Pastry and Filling

1. In a large bowl, combine flour with the grated butter with your hands or a pastry blender. Add the rest of the ingredients and mix well until smooth.

2. Transfer the pastry to a flat surface and divide in half. Wrap each half in cling film and refrigerate for at least 1 hour. One half will be the base and the other half the surface.

To make the filling, whisk the ground almonds with the sugar. Pour in the egg whites and almond extract (optional) to form a sturdy paste. Wrap in cling film and refrigerate along with the pastry.

Assembling and Baking

1. Prepare a baking sheet with a double layer of parchment paper. Preheat oven to 200°c / 392°F.

2. Roll out one half of the pastry on a floured surface to 0.5cm / 0.2" thickness. Use your cutter to cut out the shapes and transfer to the prepared sheet, at least 2cm / 0.8" apart.

3. Roll out the almond paste filling and use the same cutter as the pastry. Press the sides of the cut filling inward to make it smaller. Place on top of the pastry shapes in the baking sheet. Brush the edges of the pastry (around the filling) with milk.

4. Roll out the second half of the pastry and cut out the shapes. Transfer the pastry on top of the filling to make the surface. Press the edges to glue it down to the base that has been brushed with milk.

Brush the surface with a very light layer of milk. Bake for 18-20 minutes and take out before they start to get golden. Transfer to a cooling rack and let cool.

Decorating

1. Melt the white chocolate (or chocolate of preference) until smooth. Stir in 2 tbsp of flavorless oil (for shine and texture).

2. (Optional) Add the food colour gel to the divided chocolate. (You can use a drop of lilac to reduce the yellow tones from the white one.)

3. Place a baking sheet underneath the cooling rack. Pour the white chocolate over the figolli. You can reuse the white chocolate that drips into the baking sheet.

4. Let the chocolate dry completely (ideally do not refrigerate).

5. (Optional) Mix some purple food coloring powder with 1/2 a tsp of vodka to make the speckles. Use a brush and your fingers to speckle. Enjoy!

Notes

Store in a cool dry place wrapped in cling film for up to a month.


My cutter size: 8cm by 6cm / 3.25" by 2.5". If you are using a bigger cutter, simply bake for a few more minutes.

Keep an eye on them and take them out of the oven before they start to get golden.

For gluten free figolli, simple use GF flour and add 1/4 tsp xanthan gum.

Cadbury created the modern chocolate Easter egg after developing a pure cocoa butter that could be moulded into smooth shapes.









Did you know.


Stunning underground Valletta secret garden finally open to the public after 400 years.

After four centuries, one of Malta's hidden treasures has at last opened its doors to the public. The Mysterium Fidei Museum will be organising tours into the underground world lying beneath the St. Catherine's Monastery in Valletta.

The monastery was closed off to the public as it was used by monastic nuns who chose to lock themselves from the outside world for as long as they lived.

St. Catherine's Monastery was originally built to take care of female orphans during the time of the Knights of Saint John in the year 1575.

The monastery itself was built on the stones dug up from the quarry underneath the monastery. The open quarry was then turned into the stunning underground complex you will now finally be able to explore.



However, now visitors can immerse themselves into the everyday life at the monastery and discover the fascinating history this mysterious monastery has to offer.




