An Iconic Monument in the heart of Valletta, Malta----Manoel Theatre

The Manoel Theatre in Malta is both a historical monument of immense cultural value as well as the most important performing arts venue.

The Manoel Theatre dates back to the early 18th century. It is the "third oldest in Europe" and "the oldest in the Commonwealth of Nations", and still in operation.

Antonio Manoel De Vilhena, Grand Master of the Sovereign Military Order at the time, in 1731 decided to build a public theatre, – a Latin inscription above the main entrance of the theatre reads - "for the honest recreation of the people" He wasted no time and the building of the Theatre (named after him) was completed in 10 months, The original interior was similar in design to the Palermo Theatre (Italy) of that

time, being semi-circular with straight sides projecting to the stage. Alterations through the years have brought the auditorium to its present effective oval shape.

The first of all first nights was on the 9 th January 1732 with a presentation of "Merope" a grand tragedy play by Scipione Maffei, a famous Italian Author in the 18 th century, and played by members of the Sovereign Military Order. Maltese playwrights and Composers earned their place among foreign authors. It was a Maltese by the name "Nicolo Isouard who became Protectore (protector) during the French occupation of Malta in the last two years of the 18 th century.

Due to the building of the Opera House in 1861, the Manoel Theatre became private property, and when the Opera House was destroyed by fire in 1873, some of the Manoel's old glory returned – only till the Opera House was reconstructed. The Manoel theatre then served as a Dance Hall and subsequently as a Cinema.

The Malta Government acquired the building in response to public appeal and delicate process of restoration began. In December 1960 a grand opening performance of "Coppelia" by the famous "Ballet Rambert" took place.

The Manoel Theatre is now officially Malta's National Theatre Points of interest: The Theatre was the venue for the first public airing of Malta's National Anthem on the 27 th December 1922.

The three tiers of boxes are constructed entirely of wood.

On a personal note: I remember very clearly, as a young boy in the late 40's, I use to go to the theatre with a cousin of mine to watch matinee movies of "Roy Rogers, Gene Autry and Tarzan" --Johnny Weismuller, usually on a Saturday afternoon.





### Maltese rabbit stew (stuffat tal-fenek)

#### Ingredients

- 1 rabbit, jointed into 8 pieces
- sea salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste
- plain flour, for dusting
- 100ml vegetable oil
- 3 onions, finely diced
- 1 head garlic, cloves peeled and thinly sliced
- 280g tomato paste
- 2 tbsp curry powder
- 1 tbsp ground turmeric
- 1 tbsp paprika
- 1 tbsp ground cumin
- **1.5 litres** chicken stock
- 4 potatoes, peeled cut into 2 cm dice
- **300g** podded peas **1 cup** parsley leaves

### Marinade

- 100ml olive oil
- 1 head garlic, peeled
- 350ml red wine
- 5 bay leaves
- 3 cinnamon sticks
- 4-star anise 3 cloves

### **Cook's notes**

Oven temperatures are for conventional; if using fan-forced (convection), reduce the temperature by  $20^{\circ}$ C. | We use Australian tablespoons and cups: 1 teaspoon equals 5 ml; 1 tablespoon equals 20 ml; 1 cup equals 250 ml. | All herbs are fresh (unless specified) and cups are lightly packed. | All vegetables are medium size and peeled, unless specified. | All eggs are 55-60 g, unless specified.

### Instructions

### Marinating time: 2 hours

To make the marinade, combine all the ingredients in a non-metallic bowl. Add the rabbit pieces, combine well, then cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours.

Drain the rabbit pieces, reserving the marinade. Pat the rabbit dry, season to taste and dust with flour. Heat the vegetable oil in a large heavy-based saucepan over medium-high heat. Add the rabbit and cook until golden on both sides. Remove from the pan and set aside. Reduce the heat to medium, then add the onion and garlic and cook for 5 minutes or until softened. Add the tomato paste and spices and stir for a few minutes or until fragrant.

Add the reserved marinade and simmer for 15 minutes or until the mixture is almost dry. Return the rabbit pieces to the pan. Add the stock and simmer for 20 minutes or until reduced by one third. Cover with a lid, reduce the heat to low and cook for another 40 minutes. Add the potatoes and cook for another 30 minutes or until tender.

A few minutes before serving, stir in the peas. Scatter with parsley and serve.



16. Aussies drink 1.7 billion litres of beer per year, that's about 680 bottles of beer for each adult.


17. Australia's Capital city, Canberra, meant "woman's cleavage" in Aborigine and was named that because the city is cradled between two mountains.

18. In Canberra it is legal to film hard core porn and selling the end-product has been made legal in the city. (Being a politician must get boring!)


19. AFL (Australian Rules Football) was invented to keep Cricketers fit in the off season, there are claims that the game may have been influenced by Indigenous Australians.
