

DUDLEY WILLIAM MASON GC and the SS OHIO



Dudley William Mason is fondly remembered by the Maltese as the 40-year-old brave captain who mastered the SS Ohio, that large and fast Texaco tanker built in just seven months, which played a pivotal role in Operation Pedestal – also known as the Santa Marija Convoy – during World War II. Caption Mason was awarded the George Cross

medal in September 1942.

On 10 August 1942, a convoy of fourteen merchant ships, including the tanker SS Ohio, laden with 12,000 tons of oil, passed Gibraltar en route to Malta with vital supplies (Operation Pedestal). From the 11th the convoy and its escorts were under continuous attack from enemy aircraft and submarines. On the 12th, while approaching the Skerki Channel between Sicily and Tunisia, the Ohio was hit by a torpedo from the Italian submarine Axum and her steering damaged. On the 13th she was bombed and her boiler room hit. A German bomber then crashed on her, breaking her back. She was taken in tow, but the lines parted. Lines were reattached. She eventually entered Grand harbour, Valletta, lashed between two destroyers on 15 August. Only five of the fourteen ships had reached Malta. Of these the Ohio was the most important and one of the most heavily attacked. Their arrival was crucial for the island's ability to hold out and play a significant strategic role in the 8th Army's campaign against Rommel in North Africa. Citation

The KING has been graciously pleased to award the GEORGE CROSS to Captain Dudley William Mason, Master, s.s. "Ohio." During the passage to Malta of an important convoy Captain Mason's ship suffered most violent onslaught. She was a focus of attack throughout and was torpedoed early one night. Although gravely damaged, her engines were kept going and the Master made a magnificent passage by hand-steering and without a compass. The ship's gunners helped to bring down one of the attacking aircraft. The vessel was hit again before morning, but though she did not sink, her engine room was wrecked. She was then towed. The unwieldy condition of the vessel and persistent enemy attacks made progress slow, and it was uncertain whether she would remain afloat. All next day progress somehow continued and the ship reached Malta after a further night at sea. The violence of the enemy could not deter the Master from his purpose. Throughout he showed skill and courage of the highest order and it was due to his determination that, in spite of the most persistent enemy opposition, the vessel, with her valuable cargo, eventually reached Malta and was safely berthed. DISTRICT UNITES TO CELEBRATE BR EDWARD GALEA'S 100TH BIRTHDAY

The District of Ireland, Great Britain and Malta united in celebration on Saturday August 17th to honour Br. Edward Galea on his 100th birthday.

Br. Edward, who is part of the De La Salle College Community, is truly a legend throughout Malta and beyond as he continues to devote his time, energy and wisdom to help inspire the young people entrusted to his care.

While Br. Edward will turned 100 on August 16th, the official celebration took place on Saturday, 17th with a concelebrated Mass of thanksgiving led by Mgr. Chares J. Scicluna, Archbishop of Malta. For the mass, a number of priests, most of them former students of De La Salle College, were in attendance. The Mas



was held at the parish church and sanctuary of Our Lady of Graces, Zabbar - the village were Bro Edward was born and the parish church where he received Baptism.

This was followed by a reception at De La Salle College, where Bro Edward spent most of his life, which is situated not too far from Zabbar.

Born as Anthony on August 16th 1924 in Żabbar, in May 1939 he left Malta with another 11 aspirants and travelled to the Juniorate at Avignon, France. Despite the outbreak of war in September 1939 he stayed in France and was given the religious name of Tiburce Marie and when in Malta in 1945, he started being called Edward.

In 1940, he started his novitiate at Pibrac, near Toulouse and in 1942, he moved to St Maurice L'Exile and was given a special ID card allowing him restricted movement. He and the other Maltese Brothers were almost discovered by the Nazi due to their British passports and they decided to flee from St Maurice L'Exil. Edward headed to the Immaculate Conception Boarding School in Bezier where he started his first teaching practice in an elementary class.

At the end of August 1944, since much of France had been liberated, he returned to St Maurice L'Exil to finish his studies and eight months later when the war was over, they were all sent back to Malta.


Since then, Brother Edward has been teaching and helping in the administration at De La Salle College for over 70 years. He was Director (1963-1968), Sub-Director (1968-1971), Director (1971-1974) and Teacher (1974-1975). After a Renewal session (1975-1976) in Sangre, he was again appointed Director (1976-1978), Deputy Head Junior School (1978-1980), Sub-Director (1980-1983), Sixth Year Master (1980-1985) and Director of Novices (1986-1990).

In 1990, Brother Edward was Head of Junior School and throughout the years he has always led by example making sure to encourage every student with his optimism and enthusiasm. In the new millennium when a lay Head took over the educational running of the Junior School, he took over the role of Mentor.

He continued to teach religion, take part in school assemblies, organise prayer meetings for both students and staff, animate Mass for the different year groups, attend all meetings, and contribute to the running of the school.

LANDLORDS TO BE FINED UP TO €10,000 IF CAUGHT RENTING TO MORE THAN 10 PEOPLE

The law, which does not apply to families, will take effect at the end of October 2024



Overcrowded flats have been а recurring issue in Malta's rental market. Anyone caught renting property to more than 10 people will face a fine of up to €10,000, according to a new legal notice.

The new law comes amid reports of overcrowding in properties, with foreign workers paying cheap rent

to sleep in rooms crammed with bunkbeds. In the legal notice, the number of occupants allowed in an apartment is based on the number of bedrooms and bathrooms it has.

A maximum of two tenants can occupy a single-bedroom apartment, a maximum of four can reside in a two-bedroom residence and six people can share a three-bedroom dwelling.

Four-bedroom and five-bedroom accommodations must have two bathrooms to house eight and 10 residents, respectively.

The law, which does not apply to families, will take effect within two months, at the end of October. Those in violation of the law are subject to a fine ranging from €2,500 to €10,000 and can also be prosecuted in court. It comes after Housing Minister Roderick Galdes announced plans for new rental regulations in March.

Existing planning regulations already limit occupancy to six people per dwelling but these regulations carry no penalties. Overcrowded apartments have been a recurring issue in Malta's rental market. On Tuesday, *Times of Malta* reported that a policeman was renting out a cockroach-infested three-bedroom house in Sliema to 16 tenants, each paying €250 a month.


A former tenant described how he was attracted to the property by its low rent and "no deposit policy" but soon found the conditions at the house "really difficult".

"I did my best to keep the place clean but there were 16 people... I should have been able to come home and relax but I was sad," he said.

Last year, *Times of Malta* also revealed how a Sliema apartment was housing 40 tenants, with up to nine people sleeping in a single room.

Most are foreign workers, who struggle to find affordable housing and are often discriminated against. Last month, a housing agent advertised a property with the warning "no Pakis, Indians, Arabs and Philippines" after accidentally publishing a landlord's "restrictions" for prospective tenants.

THE MALTESE IN TUNISIA

Born in 1975, Katel Delia lives between Malta and Paris. She creates installations combining photography, sculpture, sound and writing. All immigrations are unique, but they share an attachment to a territory and very often wounds related to what we have to leave. A country can one day be the one that welcomes and then decades later the one that must be left for various reasons and vice versa. Being aware of this helps us to have more empathy for people who are fleeing their countries.

Book launch by Katel Delia "Malta - Tunis - Marseille"

Congratulations to Katel Delia on the presentation of her book, at the Valletta Design Cluster on August 23. A book that takes us on a journey to Malta, Tunisia and Marseille, through time and under the prime of migratory paths.

In addition to Katel Delia's contemporary photos, the book compiles archives of Maltese migrations to the former protectorate of Tunisia, common in the 19th and 20th centuries.

Katel said "I established a connection with the places and the streets of Tunis, La Goulette and Le Khram. I reclaimed them, together with the memories giving them a universal sense. More than a century ago, Maltese fled poverty to join Tunisia, a land of promise for a better future, today crossing is the other way... Katel said ""Because of my Maltese father's origins, who settled in Tunisia at the beginning of the 20th century until 1961, I feel a deep attachment to this country, even though I've never lived there. The courses at University of Malta (UM) at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels are designed to produce highly-qualified professionals in multiple disciplines. To pursue their studies at UM, local students require the Matriculation Certificate awarded by the MATSEC Board while international students require equivalent qualifications.

The language of instruction at UM is English. Applicants who have completed their secondary education overseas must satisfy UM's English language requirements by presenting a Secure English Language Test (SELT) result.

A basic Foundation Studies Course enables international high school students, who have completed their secondary or high school education overseas, but who do not have the necessary entry requirements, to qualify for admission to an undergraduate degree course at UM.

Another opportunity provided by UM to apply for a course at undergraduate and taught postgraduate level is through the Recognition and Accreditation of Prior Learning (RPL).

HISTORY OF FLORIANA



The Wignacourt Water Tower in Floriana was built during the reign of the Grand Master Alof de Wignacourt in the 17th century. This tower formed an important part of the aqueduct system which was built by the knight to carry water from Rabat to Valletta.

The turret designed by Bontadini in Floriana just opposite Sarria Church as seen today. More or less intact, though it misses the coronet of delicate stone fleur-de-lys formerly running around its corniche as seen in a drawing by Dutch artist Willem Schellinks (1623-1678)

CHEESE PRODUCER AND PROFESSOR JOIN FORCES TO REVIVE THE PRODUCTION OF CHEESE FROM GOATS-SHEEP MILK

Cheese is a product produced from milk, the majority of it coming from cows but also from other animal's milk such as goats and sheep. During time, the number of herdsmen who produced cheese from goats and sheep had decreased with the consequence that products made from milk of these animals also decreased.

TVMnews met with Mark Xerri and Prof. David Mifsud who joined forces to revive the production of cheese through goats and sheep *milk*. *Cheese producer Mark Xerri*. Cheese products have names such as Ġiżwita, Fratell, Karmelitan, Franġiskan, Dumnikan and Kapuċċin. These names were given to 10 different cheeses produced from milk of Maltese goats and sheep.

The names of these types of cheeses originated from Maltese monastic orders in medieval convents in France, Italy and around Europe. They did not use preservatives but used to preserve cheese of that era, exactly as we are doing by producing it in a scientific and technological way. Xerri told TVMnews that the milk fermentation process applies the knowledge of science and this local cheese is produced without any added substances. Good healthy bacteria are use to ferment the cheese and to give it a particular taste.

The milk for this cheese is produced by herdsmen in Żejtun who rear goats and sheep. If traces of medicine are found in the milk, it cannot be fermented in cheese, however when the milk is pasteurized, the bacteria is eliminated and good bacteria is added to ferment the milk in cheese.

Mark Xerri and Professor David Mifsud have been recently awarded with the 'Premju Ġieħ l-Artiġjanat Malti' for their produced cheese in the category of artisan products.

The Ethiopian nationals who are being detained and facing deportation after having lived and worked legally in Malta for years should be released immediately, the Migrants Commission, the Justice and Peace Commission and JRS Malta urged the authorities.

The two commissions, which form part of the Archdiocese of Malta, and JRS Malta are wholeheartedly condemning the recent arrest of several Ethiopian nationals, who were rounded up, detained and told they will be sent back to Ethiopia.

They called on all Members of Parliament, especially the Social Affairs Committee, to convene and discuss this matter with urgency so that in collaboration with civil society organisations they could find a solution that respected individual rights and safeguarded every member of our society. The three entities also urged the authorities to create realistic pathways to regularisation for these Ethiopians and other individuals.

"We consider these recent actions to be unjust, indiscriminate and cruel and call upon the government to immediately release these individuals and to regularise their position," the entities said in a joint statement. The entities called on the authorities to heed the message of Pope Francis who during his General Audience yesterday dedicated his message to migrants and singled out the good Samaritans who did their utmost to rescue and save injured and abandoned migrants on the routes of desperate hope, in the five continents.

"These courageous men and women are a sign of a humanity that does not allow itself to be contaminated by the malign culture of indifference and rejection – it is our indifference and that attitude of rejection that kills migrants," Pope Francis said.

The three entities said these Ethiopians were being targeted under the pretext of having come to Malta irregularly to seek asylum, which at the time was not granted. Despite this, most spent years — up to 17 years in some cases — living and working with the knowledge and authorisation of the authorities, who granted them employment licences, and residence permits.

Over the years they have contributed to society and become an integral part of the community, paying their taxes and social solidarity contributions.

"They are valued and trained employees, whose experience will be hard to replace. They are our neighbours, our colleagues, our friends, the people who greet us in the street, who care for our elderly relatives, and cleaned our hospital wards during the COVID-19 pandemic," the entities said.

These incidents are the latest in a series of raids, which saw the lives of tens of migrants who had made Malta their home upended without warning and locked up, so that preparations can be made to send them to their country of origin.

Beyond the impact such actions had on these persons, it created a climate of fear and insecurity for members of society who over the past years contributed to everyone's wellbeing. These actions are constant reminders by the State of how easily it can arbitrarily and indiscriminately trample over all the accomplishments these members of society achieved through their hard work and sacrifices.

"Such unjust practices and policies create fear and discrimination, and undermine the very fabric of our communities," they said.

Quoting Pope Francis's encyclical *Fratelli Tutti*, the Church entities said society should be built on respect, trust, solidarity and an acknowledgement of "the inalienable dignity of each human person regardless of origin, race or religion, and the supreme law of fraternal love".

ORESTE L AQUILINA JP ONE OF THE PIONEERS OF THE MALTESE COMMUNITY OF NSW



Oreste Aquilina arrived in Australia in 1956 at age 19 and had his first job in Sydney working in a haberdashery shop for a few weeks. Coming from a Public Service job in Malta he sat for the Commonwealth Public Service exam and went into the Postmaster General Department and Commonwealth Tender Board. He completed further studies in real estate, computing, accountancy, a four-year course in Personnel Administration, as well as many Defence and ACOA courses as a delegate on the Administrative and Clerical Officers Association and holds a N.A.A.T.I. Gr. 3 Interpreter certificate. During his 40 years'

public service, he went from the P.M.G. Department to the Department of Agriculture before working for the Department of Defence for some thirty years. He also worked part time as a subtitler for 18 years with SBS TV and later as an SBS Broadcaster in the Maltese language as well as a part-time Court Interpreter. He served as a Justice of the Peace for NSW since 1982.

Oreste has some unpublished works including an appraisal of promotional aspects of the Australian public service. He also produced a Maltese/English Picture Dictionary for his family. Another unpublished paper dealing with Maltese history, language, religious feasts, Maltese culture, and Maltese migration was prepared during his term as Development Officer at La Valette Social Centre. This was a lecture paper prepared for an educational session for the retirement village and included several Maltese recipes for kitchen staff. Being involved in many associations, he contributed to amending and creating some associations. He wrote articles for various magazines and an occasional article in the Maltese Herald in both English and Maltese languages.

Oreste is a life member of the Catholic Club, now known as the City Tattersall's Club and of the South Sydney Junior Leagues Club.

While he is proud to be of Maltese origin, he is also very proud to call himself an Australian citizen. He received his 30 Years public Service Medal, a Bicentenary plaque, and Certificate for his Chairmanship of the Australian / Maltese Monument. In his retirement Oreste took up painting and singing with several choirs, and as a choral singer he is proud to have backed the great Luciano Pavarotti in Stockholm and to have sang at the Opening Ceremony of the Sydney 2000 Olympics.



THE LAST GHONNELLA

Under her ghonnella, Censa's skirt would reach her ankles

If you were to ask any Gozitan about the last *għonnella*, his or her mind would turn to no other than Ċensa Vella whose *għonnella* would have been seen meandering the streets of Victoria until early 1991.

The *faldetta* as the *ghonnella* is known in English, was a full-length gown, arching over the head to lend an air of modesty. The irony was that although Ċensa sought no attention, she inadvertently attracted followers of all ages. Hundreds of negatives must have found themselves in dark rooms on an international level, as her solid-black

hooded garment would bloom out of a solution. Censa was as delicate as the silk she wore, her gentle ways as appealing as its pleated folds.

Ċensa's father, Vincenzo Vella, had served with the Royal Artillery in World War 1 and was buried in Quebec. Marie-Roz Cremona was Ċensa's mother whose own mother was from Switzerland; known as "il-Mamma-Mi", she had served as midwife to families of the British forces in Chambray.

To mention that the family were devout Catholics would be an understatement.

Ċensa's uncle, Mgr Luigi Vella, is currently in the process of beatification. A monument to him stands proudly in Savina Square, next to the church he had had enlarged, within which Ċensa spent many an 'hour' in quiet devotion to the Holy Eucharist, a practice known as *is-siegħa*, instituted by her very uncle.

The street leading from the monument to Censa's house is now named after him.

Ċensa's elder sister, Giorgia, would also attend daily Mass at dawn before going about her household chores and daily cooking. I can still recall her tasty dishes made with fresh eggs laid by hens kept in two lofts.

Meanwhile, Censa was only too happy to do shopping rounds, which often included a stop for fresh fish, for which she had a discerning eye (as intimated so nicely by the adjoining photo captured by photographer Daniel Cilia in the 1980s). Censa would also buy fish for the many cats that followed her around, as did neighbourhood children, knowing that she always had a kind word for them.

"Bonġu, Ċensa, hoy" you would hear them call out cheerily from doorways, as well as on brushing past her *għonnella* in Victoria's quaint alleyways.

Nicknames abound on the island of Calypso, and Censa's family has not escaped tradition. The family were known as *Tad-Dubloon*, which refers to Spanish gold coins they possessed, along with several properties in the capital, before the individual houses were sold off as wars came and went. Censa, along with her seven brothers and sisters, was brought up in an extensive medieval corner house in the vicinity of the lush Lunzjata valley in Victoria.

Dating from the time of the Great Siege, it has a reconstructed exterior balcony with crescents, carved out of limestone, in its original style.

Trust was the order of the day in Čensa's time; a large key would have been left in the front door lock. The open courtyard at the entrance gave on to a sweeping staircase while a framed painting by Millet, depicting potato diggers bowing their heads in recitation of the Angelus, used to hang by the landing, reminding guests that they were entering a blessed home – being dedicated to prayer, Čensa and her sisters were referred to by the locals as *sorijiet tad-dar* or house nuns. These are not to be confused with the religious members of the MUSEUM movement which had its own distinct character; in the latter case, females enrolled in the religious society also wore *ghonnelli* in the early

days but their dress became modified over time. Under her *ghonnella*, Ċensa's skirt, which lay over many petticoats, would reach her ankles.

Little did she imagine that she had become a symbol of the century that was dying away My recollections are filled with happy memories of Ċensa's spiritual way of life. It was like entering a convent, as the mumbling of the rosary could be heard until sundown, to the rattling tune of lace bobbins or *cumbini*, as close neighbours and female relatives would lean forward on rattan chairs to rest their lace-making cushion *trajbu* or *mħadda* against the wall or the back of another chair, under the open-arched passageway upstairs. This gave on to a sunny patio brimming with plants, enveloped delightfully in the scent of jasmine.

Ċensa would be working on her *moska* pattern in the open doorway of her adjoining bedroom. The dining room nearby had a decor of antique furnishings, lit sternly by oil lamps before evening prayer and early bedtimes. Frames with biblical pictures served to remind you of your immortality, as images of purgatory warned of Judgement Day. A glass-domed baby Jesus surrounded by minute beaded flowers lay next to effigies of saints in glass pillars on the white marble top of a chest of drawers with sculptures in the shape of a lion's head. A showcase (*vettrin*) solidly witnessed the devotion of the makers of *bizzilla* (lace) in the winter months.

Yet, although Ċensa was surrounded by this solemnity and went about in charmingly simple ways, she sported a sense of humour shared by one of her cousins with whom she had enjoyed many a prank in her younger days. One such incident included the delivery of a letter to Ċensa's sweet-natured elder sister Teresa – only this had originally been intended for Ċensa herself – from an English soldier stationed in a nearby field. So it was that Teresa ended up marrying Frederick Gould instead and thus left Gozo for Norwich, where she had an only child, my bubbly grandma Mary Melita.

Melita, in turn, married a jovial Londoner, William Joseph Tyler, also in the army. So in came another nickname, *Tal-Ġinġer*, as my mother's generation and mine would be referred to.

Mum's siblings also adored Gozo, although like their parents, they would all initially settle down in England, with Uncle Patrick moving to Australia. Friends and relatives in Victoria always ask after them whenever I visit Gozo from Greater London, where I myself have settled.

Ċensa spent many an hour in quiet devotion to the Holy Eucharist at the church of the Nativity of Our Lady, better known as Ta' Savina, in Victoria.

Ċensa, on the other hand, only got as far as Malta. She used to visit Sliema regularly at one point when her sister Teresa and Frederick had been stationed at Tigné Barracks.

Ċensa's brothers, on the other hand, doing their part in World War I, went abroad. One of them is buried in Ontario, Canada, another in Wales. Sadly, the war took its toll on the youngest, Mikiel, a blacksmith, who was to suffer from post-traumatic stress after seeing fighting in Gallipoli.

Ċensa and Giorgia treated their brothers with deference: as children, my younger sister, Tanya, and I would be mindful not to disturb our great-granduncles' mealtimes or siesta. We would join Ċensa in her small, quaint room filled with an assortment of Nativity crib figures, knick-knacks and curiosities. I was in my element as Ċensa loved literature and art. Her brother Emmanuel had been a professional photographer and the antechamber downstairs had been his studio. His own nickname, *Tal-Fekruna*, had been earned after he had taken home an injured sea turtle, placing it in a tank in the well room; neighbours would gather around to see it.

of us knew and loved; that she would become part of the folklore of a gem of an island.

Yes, while Censa is buried next to my grandparents in Gozo, the memory of her last *ghonnella*, which is cherished by my mother, is precious because the wearer engendered the very values and traditions of its nation. It was worn with humility, love and sincerity.
